Related Cinema Programme

Tuesday 21 July 6.30pm

The Garden

Dir: Derek Jarman. Selected by Susanne Nielsen, The Garden reflects the world of the late great artist gardener. The Garden is one of Derek Jarman's most personal films and was shot at his beloved 'atomic' garden in Dungeness. The story reflects on press and government intrusion on gay life and is also a coming to terms of his own HIV positive condition. Jarman famously rejected a knighthood from Margaret Thatcher, instead accepting canonization from the Sisters of Perpetual Indulgence as St. Derek of Dungeness of the Order of Celluloid Kings. Stand By Me

Dir: Rob Reiner. Fittingly selected by GANGHUT, with their collaborative practice built upon a similar sense of memories of childhood companionship; a nostalgia more for when they were kids when this film was originally released rather than when it was set. Stand By Me is a coming of age drama set in the late 1950s in the USA, based on a short story by Stephen King.

Tuesday 8 August 8.15pm

Red Dawn

Dir: John Milius. Also selected by artist collective GANGHUT, Red Dawn is perhaps the ultimate gang movie in which a group of teenagers form an unlikely resistance to a Soviet invasion of America. A classic of the Ronald Reagan era.

Scanners

Dir: David Cronenberg. Appropriately selected by John Louden, David Cronenberg's Scanners is a paranoid classic of mind control. Already famous for body horror films like Shivers, The Brood and Rabid, Cronenberg's Scanners is a more cerebral and less out and out horror film.

Summer Exhibitions at Dundee Contemporary Arts

4 July - 30 August

Susanne Nørregård Nielsen, Red Yellow Blue **GANGHUT**. Hands Across The Fire **Rob Hunter & John Louden**, It's Not You - It's Us (Medusa Complex)(Corridor of Doom)

The three concurrent Summer exhibitions at DCA are about confluence. A solo artist, a duo and a twelve member art collective have separate spaces but do all share certain sensibilities and are closely connected to the flourishing art scene in contemporary Dundee.

Susanne Nørregård Nielsen has a longstanding fascination with modernist art from the first decades of the 20th Century. Susanne is also interested in playing with the notion of classification between botany and art history. Red Yellow Blue centres around a large glasshouse designed for the light filled first gallery. This greenhouse contains plants that the artist Piet Mondrian drew in the early part of his career in the first few decades of the 20th Century. His flower imagery is less well known than his abstract geometric work but is crucial to his development as an artist and profoundly revealing in terms of his personal relationship with nature. Susanne and DCA staff have been busy for several months planting chrysanthemums, roses, gladioli, dahlias, irises, marigolds and sunflowers at the Dundee Botanic Gardens and within Susanne's own garden. The transposition of Susanne's work from meadow, beach or garden to white cube gallery offers her a further counterpoint; bringing nature into the gallery, evoking Mondrian's journey from nature to abstraction. Susanne will also present works from her other series, notably her kites inspired by Kazimir Malevich and a stile originally installed at the intersection between tall grassland and a wildflower meadow. The structure reflects the proportions and forms characteristic of De Stijl aesthetics and is a play on words and form similar in tone to the great gardener artist and classical radical, Ian Hamilton Finlay.

Originally from Denmark but now based near Dundee, Susanne often explores juxtapositions of aesthetic styles and has a key interest in early abstract art, particularly the De Stijl movement and the works of Mondrian and Malevich. Susanne was born in 1970 in Svendborg, Denmark and studied Screen Printing at the Copenhagen Technical College between 1987 and 1991, she subsequently attained a PG Dip at PWSSP, in Poland from 1993-1995 and a BA Hons at Glasgow School of Art in 1998 where she has subsequently taught for the last ten years. Susanne has undertaken a fellowship at the Pier Arts Centre, Orkney in 2001 and a residency with Stills Gallery, Edinburgh in 2007. Susanne has exhibited in recent years at Galleri Hornbaek, Hornbaek, Denmark, The Mackintosh Gallery at Glasgow School of Art and The Crawford Arts Centre and The St. Andrews Botanic Garden, St Andrews and has been featured prominently in the photographic journals Source and Katalog - an international guarterly magazine published by the Museum of Photographic Arts. Denmark. Susanne has just produced a new print with the DCA Print Studio.

GANGHUT are an artist collective founded upon utopian ideology, the psychology of social structures and friendship. It is also about a gang mentality and memories of childhood dens and play. GANGHUT consists of (on this occasion) twelve artists who all either studied, live or used to live in Dundee and so this represents a real homecoming and also their largest exhibition to date. Previous projects have taken place at Spike Island, Bristol, Scottish Sculpture Workshop, Lumsden, Edinburgh Sculpture Workshop and the Next Wave Art Festival, Melbourne. The large gallery at DCA will feature a series of impressive structures devised in collaboration between the artists in GANGHUT, Draw Architects, Edinburgh and the artists who form the technical crew of DCA. The process will give rise to a series of events including talks, screenings and gigs. GANGHUT have an evolving membership, called upon on a project by project basis. GANGHUT currently comprise the following artists: Stephen Murray, Jason Nelson, Kevin Reid, Suzie Scott, Derek Lodge, Amy Marletta, Sarah Forrest, Mark Hunter, Graeme Roger, Joseph Haughey, Abby Loveland Roger and Malcolm Cheyne. Each of them are practicing artists in their own right and GANGHUT began from Kevin Reid having a residency at Spike Island in Bristol in 2004 which developed into a full-scale project.

Teamwork, commitment and debate are strong hallmarks of the GANGHUT ethos. Entitled Hands Across The Fire, their project for DCA delivers pyrotechnics, watch towers inside and outwith the gallery and a central stage area designed in collaboration with Draw Architects, Edinburgh. Each of the GANGHUT artists have individual artworks within the installation and have also made an editioned print with the DCA Print Studio which is brought together as a GANGHUT portfolio.

Rob Hunter & John Louden have collaborated together for sixteen years from when they were students at Edinburgh College of Art. Both born in 1972, they produced a collaborative degree show exhibition in 1994 entitled And So It's Goodnight From Me, And It's Goodnight From Him, Goodnight named after the famous parting shot of the Two Ronnies. They have continued to work together on selected works across a range of media. Both artists produce work separately and have been mainstays of the art scene in Dundee for the last ten years.

Occupying the vast concourse space from the main entrance that leads to the galleries, one hundred wall-mounted heads reference numerous classical myths in a site-specific project supported by a Dundee Visual Arts Award. It's Not You - It's Us (Medusa Complex) (Corridor of Doom) is a body of new work that is both specifically for and of DCA. 100 portraits representing a social network of both of the artists and by extension the venue itself are rendered in clusters alongside the walkway to the gallery. The differently coloured and sized silhouettes are derived from photographs taken by Rob Hunter and John Louden of their chosen subjects. Each is rendered frozen as if by Medusa with the eyes all formed as mirror reliefs (it was a mirror that Perseus used to defeat Medusa). Lightening the mood but adding to the myth, the artists return to their influences with the addition of self-portraits, making a nod to duo partnerships in the realm of television, film, music and art history.
