# Baking with Boris (La boulangerie de Boris)

#### Synopsis:


Every morning, Boris the village baker makes a fresh batch of crusty bread and pastries for all his neighbours until... Achoo! He can't stop sneezing. He has become allergic to flour. How will he manage to keep baking for everyone in the village?

This is a heartwarming and humorous short movie about how a community helps their baker, Boris when he finds out he is allergic to flour. This is a film about friendship, society, differences, support and learning.

#### **Teacher's notes:**

This pack covers the following Experiences and Outcomes for 1st level:

### Activity 1: Where does bread come from?

Ask the learners if they know where bread comes from and how it is made. What sort of bread can we buy? Are they all the same shape?

With your class, watch the video 'Bread – How it's made for Kids by clicking on the link: https://youtu.be/1zUW6sqbM-U

After the video, ask the learners where they think the bread will go (e.g. bakery, shops, restaurants).

Print the worksheet (Appendix 1: Where does bread come from?)

The learners will have to link each sentence to the correct picture.



#### Activity 2: Baking/Science

#### Why not make bread in a bag?

Follow the link: https://www.yourhomebasedmom.com/bread-in-a-bag/ to find the recipe. It also encourages you to discuss the science behind bread making.

Please be mindful that some of your learners may have a gluten-free diet (this recipe can be adapted to suit their needs as stated at the end of the webpage)

Alternatively, this recipe could be sent home as a homework task.



#### Activity 3: Modern Languages (French)

Learn the vocabulary for some bakery products using the different Powerpoints:

#### Activity 3: Modern Languages (French)

The mini flashcards (Appendix 2) can be printed to use for many activities including:

- Checking individual understanding (e.g. 'Show me: un croissant.')
- Snap
- Pairs (pelmanism)
- Kim's game (small groups)

You could set up a shop in your classroom where the learners would buy bread in French. The learners would simply say: 'Une baguette, s'il vous plaît!' You could then extend this to fruits and vegetables. You could also introduce numbers for the learners to ask for different quantities, e.g. 'Trois baguettes, s'il vous plaît!'

If your school is based in Dundee, you can access free French resources by requesting access to L2 curriculum and resources (French) on Teams (dundeeschools).

#### **Discussion Points:**

- 1 Watch the trailer: <a href="https://youtu.be/Go943nefzo8">https://youtu.be/Go943nefzo8</a> before attending the screening.

  Ask the children what they think the film is about. Who is Boris? What does he do for a living? Is he good at it? What problem do you think Boris is about to face?
- 2 What are allergies?
  - How do we know that Boris is allergic to flour? What can we do to help?

- When he discovers his allergy, Boris is really upset. Why do you think that is? (He loves his job, he is really good at it and doesn't know what else to do, it is a family business...)
  - How do we know this is a family business? Remind the learners of the starting scene, where Boris gets up for work and goes down the stairs. What is on the wall? What do they represent? How many generations of bakers have been in Boris' family before him?

## Where does bread come from?

Match each sentence to the correct picture.



The bags of flour are sent to the bakery.




The wheat is crushed to make flour.



This is baked in an oven.



Seeds are sown in a field.



Then, the bread is sliced, packaged and delivered to the shop.




The seeds grow into wheat, which is then harvested.



Flour is mixed together with other ingredients such as yeast, sugar, water and salt.
